Unless you're another man who thinks that scoring and then abandoning women is the best thing in the world, you will probably be more or less annoyed or even disgusted by the author's shallow world view and selfish actions. But in between these rather awful parts, there are some real gems of insight into Danish culture and Danish women (and men). I, as a Dane, certainly felt like there were instances where I really felt like I discovered something I had been wondering about for most of my life. Or at least the part of my life where I have been trying to flirt with Danish girls. It's not often you get the naked truth about what a foreigner sees in your culture, especially not from over-polite Americans, so this book is very interesting. Even if the author is a well, he shows glimmers of intelligence and insight, and he writes well. Maybe one day he will hang around with a nice girl long enough to make him grow up a bit? Or maybe shallow men meet shallow women?

He does of course exaggerate for the sake of comedy and to drill his point home, but yeah, the bit about how the Copenhagen street walkers are typically prettier (they're also almost all foreigners) and sometimes even wear nicer clothing than the local girls is spot on. I've read parts of it out loud to foreign and Danish colleagues at sea and they all laughed pretty damn hard. That it sparked so much controversy here in this overly feminist society that we got ourselves into just makes it even funnier. Unfortunately the book is pretty short, but it's cheap and I have read it many times, not in its entirety, but the best and funniest parts, of which there are so many. Had I read this book when I was a teenager, I wouldn't have wasted years on the local girls, but would have looked abroad for

feminine girlfriend material. Need I say I'm happily married to a foreigner!

I bought the Kindle version. I think the book is kind of a feature length version of one of those nights where you go out and it just sucks. Well, it sounds like that's what Roosh encountered for 2 solid months. I, like many others, always thought Copenhagen would be jam packed with hot leggy blondes, but those rumors appear to be false. Roosh's writing, as always, is dry and funny. I had several LOL moments. I actually think Bang Iceland was more interesting, but maybe that's because Iceland is a more interesting country than Denmark, even if you only care about banging girls. I found the tale of his friendship with Henrik frustrating because Henrik was so obviously beta and his failure to see the light was extremely annoying. Alas, being beta in Denmark does not appear to be a major detriment to banging Danish girls. For that reason alone I wouldn't visit, because I don't want to be in a country where I have to act feminine. Moreover, to be constantly holding your tongue and tempering one's opinions for the sake of not offending someone's delicate sensibilities is not my idea of fun. Of course there are other reasons to visit a country aside from sleeping with women there, but even on that note, I would rather go someplace like Sweden instead.

Ok. I didn't read this book word for word. I never do. I concentrated, quickly, on the parts about Danish women. I'm an American and moved to Denmark 16 years ago. As different as Danish culture is from America's, I haven't had any trouble adjusting to anything but the food and the weather. I found "adjusting" to the Danish dating scene and Danish women delightfully easy in many ways. First of all, my experience is that meeting Danish girls (piger) is easy: give your name and ask for hers. She'll either ask you where you are from, or tell you she's "busy" in some way. That's all there is to it. What struck me most about these meetings is that Danish girls will ask you questions you aren't used to hearing, about your home town, your family life, your travels and they actually listen and expect you to do the same. Asking questions, listening, replying thoughtfully: give and take about something other than your job or your latest "project"...if you are unemployed. I think that must be an unusual experience for many American males; it was for me. And then, as Roosh suggests, if you are "sweet" enough, she'll ask you if you have a kæreste, the Danish term for a partner, or girlfriend, wife, etc. (There's no real distinction). Overall, my first conversations with many Danish girls have been far more intimate and less forced than in America in that these girls really do want to get to know about the stranger who just sat down next to, or walked over to, them and introduced themselves. Second, yes Danish women can be coldly practical, painfully ironic in ways that are difficult for non-Danes to digest, blunt and straightforward. But they also have a romantic

streak, just under the hood. In fact, it is a lot more than that: they yearn for romance, exactly not what they are getting from Danish men. Finally - I want to keep this short - having sex in Denmark is regarded as a normal dating activity, nothing more or less. It ranks slightly higher than giving flowers, which is obligatory, if you come over to her place for dinner. And it is also true that a Danish girl will decide if she is going to have sex with you. You'll never convince her otherwise. On the other hand, that decision is based on what she thinks about you - are you a sweet guy or not? It's not at all about commitment or whether you'll think she's cheap. The focus is on now, because after all this is just a normal dating activity and it's fun. I don't see anything here that there's not to like. That makes me wonder whether Roosh isn't a closet Victorian or else got his heart broken in Denmark. This happens quite often to American men who come here to get laid and end up falling in love, by the way. In my case, it has had lead to a 14-year marriage. Yes, Danish girls can commit! PS. Copenhagen is the nicest place I have ever lived. I can see why it's a bit difficult for tourists to get their arms around. But, in many ways, it's like Paris, a place I have always loved to visit, not for the grandeur of its palaces, monuments and museums, but rather for the romance that awaits on the side streets, a few meters away from the crowds of tourists.
