

This is the only book you'll ever need if you want to learn about writing for television. The second best book which I recommend in addition to this one is *Writing the Pilot*. The content, however, is best absorbed by seasoned writers. If you have never written a screenplay before you need to learn how to do that before thinking about reading this book. I recommend you read *Story*, *Screenplay*, *Making a Good Script Great*, *Writing for Emotional Impact* and *Save the Cat* before venturing into TV land.
